The Senator Frank Lautenberg School (School No. 6) was visited by author, Zollyann Howell, to read and discuss her book "My Momma's Glasses" with second and third graders. She spoke about how this book was written based on everyday events in her own life and encouraged the students to write down their own stories and possibly their own books one day. Mr. Raditch, reading specialist at SFLS, said, "Our students were clearly inspired by Zollyann and genuinely enjoyed her visit."



Newest DECA Chapter Make Impressive First Visit To State Conference

Rosa Parks School of Fine and Performing Arts sent eight students and their advisor, Dr. Reggie Hall, to the state conference of NJ DECA. The conference was held March 4-6, 2024, at the Harrah's Resort and Conference Center in Atlantic City, NJ. This was Rosa Parks School of Fine and Performing Arts first time attending the state conference and its students came back as winners.

- Freshman Chris Perez made it to the state semifinals in his category of competition and eventually qualified to attend the International Career Development Conference (ICDC) in Anaheim, CA.
- Freshman Keisy Taveras was selected to attend the National Youth Leadership Forum (NYLF) this summer on the campus of Yale University.
- Senior Dayanara Menendez won a \$600 scholarship.

Rosa Parks is not only one of the newest schools with a chapter of NJ DECA, but is also currently the only high school of fine and performing arts in the state to be part of it. To make it to the state conference and have winners to qualify to attend ICDC the first time around is exceptionally rare, and the students have come to say, "we are just getting started"!



## National Social Emotional Health Day

School No. 10 celebrated National Social Emotional Learning (SEL) Day on March 8 with a variety of activities focused on promoting emotional intelligence and well-being. Students participated in a rotation of SEL-based stations, each offering unique experiences to enhance their social and emotional skills.



## **MESSY CONVERSATIONS**

In an effort to promote positive school culture and climate at the Joseph A. Taub School (JATS), "Messy Conversations" was implemented. "The goals of our 'messy or unpopular' conversations are to promote clarity, understanding and respect for all," said organizer Principal Amod Field.

Staff and administration join together to have honest



conversations while following agreed upon norms created by the JATS Climate and Culture team. The school holds meetings twice a month to discuss pressing issues and gain clarity. It's considered "messy" because sometimes nothing is off the table for discussion. Staff members all understand that the discussion is for the greater good of the school. There is no hierarchy during the discussion and "I" statements are used while speaking to promote individuality. Staff members are also encouraged to voice their opinions, questions, or concerns in the JATS suggestion box anonymously.

## TEACHING ON THE DANGERS OF DIGITAL DEVICES

The Passaic County Sheriff's Department came to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. School (MLK) on March 11 to talk to students about the dangers of Cyberbullying and Sexting. The objective was to communicate the consequences of Cyberbullying and Sexting on any electronic device when used in a threatening way. Over 240 students were attentive and surprised to hear how dangerous using their digital devices in a threatening way could be. The teachers and students asked if they could return and speak more on other topics that affect the staff and students.

The event was hosted by Student Assistance Coordinator Alvin Bush, with MLK Guidance Counselors Lashawn Cheatom and Erica Carrington.

## SHOUT OUT!

Ilia Delgado is the secretary of School No. 20, the latest post in a 39 years long career with the District. She started as a student-worker before being offered a job with the District after graduation.

Apart from the first six months of her life, having been born in Puerto Rico, she has spent her entire life as a Patersonian. She started kindergarten at School No. 15, but was transferred to School No. 3 half-way through, staying there through sixth grade. She spent seventh grade at Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. when it was still on Hamilton St., but then spent eighth grade at School No. 8. She eventually went to John F. Kennedy High School and is still proud to be a Knight.



In 1983, she entered the student-worker program and was assigned to the Cooperative Office of Education. She didn't see herself staying with the District after graduation, but she made an impression on someone in the Gifted & Talented Program.

Rosalind De Maria was a secretary in that department and fought to get a position for Ms. Delgado in the District. The next year, 1984, she began working for the Gifted & Talented Program. She would later move to Human Resources in April 2005, and stay there until it was reorganized. On July 1, 2016, she found herself back in school, having been assigned to School No. 2. In January 2019 she was oved across town to her current position with School no. 20.

Ms. Delgado never left Paterson, enrolling her daughter in the same school system that she grew up in. She served as the President of the Alexander Hamilton Academy PTO when her daughter was there from K-8, being very active in the school's activities. She jumped to the Garrett Morgan Academy PTO with her daughter's enrollment in that school, but found that she was the only member involved. Then principal, Michael McGinley, noted that she was the only parent to ever show up to a meeting.

Ilia Delgado has been a great part of Paterson Public Schools though out her life, as the District has been a great part of hers. Even as she plans her eventual retirement, still a few years away, she plays with the idea of becoming a substitute teacher just to stay a part of Paterson's children's lives.

Ms. Delgado simply loves being in the schools. She enjoys watching the children grow up and move onward to high school, but is particularly happy to see them return for a visit.
